We were all quietly confident of a good performance this time around, having practised hard at meetings and specific, targeted ringing sessions, concentrating on listening and striking skills. Special thanks to Nigel for all the specialised coaching. This eventually included a successful quarter peal at Milnthorpe, which was very well struck indeed, from start to finish. It was also significant in being the first quarter peal for Will James, well done Will.

First Quarter Peal - 1

The Lancashire Lads and Lasses RWNYC band at their last practice before the contest next Saturday in Exeter.

All the 3Ls and support crew had booked accommodation well in advance for the two nights over the weekend. We set off early on Friday morning hoping to miss the worst of the traffic, which we mostly achieved. We all managed to stay quite close to the city centre, Exeter not being a large city, we were within walking distance of the Cathedral. The Cathedral of St Peter is a magnificent building and was used as the base of the all events held on the Saturday. Ringing also included other city churches and some more outlying ones.



We all rose early on Saturday morning ready for the hectic day ahead. Our competition ringing was scheduled for 10.30am at St Mark's in the method ringing section. As some pointed out later, this was good as we got over the nervous bit early and could enjoy the rest of the day! Seven teams entered this section, with 16 teams in the call change section. Our team consisted of the same six who had rung the quarter the previous weekend. Nerves were jangling as we waited patiently outside the tower for our turn, listening intently to the preceding band and the standard to beat! The band ascended the tower, together with myself as the one supporter allowed to accompany them. The bells were fairly easy to ring with a short practice piece allowed prior to the test piece. All had to be completed in 15 minutes or a penalty would be applied. The team rang very well with only minor faults and I was quietly confident of a strong placing. After the test piece I congratulated them on a very good performance. The 15 to 20

minutes in St Mark's tower was soon over and we all departed to follow a pre-arranged tower grab around the surrounding area. This included a ring for everyone on the glorious 72cwt 12 at St Peter's, which would prove memorable for one of our group, but for all the wrong reasons! (see individual articles).

Results were to be announced in the Nave of the Cathedral at 6pm. This was a very exciting presentation with all bands invited up onto the podium to collect individual medals awarded for participation and keepsakes. The results were read out and presented in reverse order as is traditional and we all counted down nervously. The last three and our name had not been called out Not third! We were in the last two the tension mounted and The Lancashire Lads and Lasses announced; we had come second! There was a brief sigh from some, followed immediately by rapturous applause and cheers. 'Second', we all realised this was a significant achievement after only one previous competition (we were unable to field a full team at Worcester). On another day, with not as many nerves and it could quite easily have been first place, as there was not much between the top two. We all celebrated with a pub supper and lots of merriment and "what ifs?"

RINGING WORLD NATIONAL YOUTH CONTEST

The following day, Sunday, those of us with any energy left, joined the local towers for service ringing (another grab being honest). Someone then had the bright idea of going to Buckfast Abbey, about 20 miles in the wrong direction I might add, for service ringing in the early afternoon. However, this turned out to be another highlight of the weekend as the 12 bells of the Abbey are superb and a delight to ring. We joined the locals and some very good striking was had. The Abbey and grounds are fantastic and well worth a visit and the weather was very kind to us to boot. If that was not enough, we then went one step further and rang the eight bells of the burnt out church at Buckfastleigh.

The least said about the journey home the better, those who had set off earlier were ok but having left the Abbey at approx. 3pm after lunch in the refectory, a closed M5 and diversions contributed to a frustrating couple of hours trying to get out of Devon....This did not matter really, as we were still on a high after such a successful weekend. Here's to 2023 in York and to bringing the trophy home!


Advanced Conducting Course - Jayden Milby

I didn't really know what to expect, but it was instantly clear that it was going to be a great weekend. I packed some of my college work in with my suitcase naively thinking there would be loads of spare time to get some done, how wrong was I! I was a student on the Advanced Conducting course, expertly tutored by Simon Linford and it certainly did not disappoint. I had plenty of 'lightbulb moments' as promised in Simon's President's Blog —

these undoubtedly have given me a much better understanding of how methods actually work. As somebody in my group said, we were promoted from bob callers to novice conductors. Aside from the actual teaching, there was absolutely loads to keep us occupied. Most of the 3Ls were there, so we rang lots together including a quarter peal on the Charmborough Ring (mini ring) as the Cadbury Red Roses (3L's + Brumdingers) which was jointly conducted by Ellis and myself:

Basic Conducting Course - Iwan Cotgreave

Despite the early mornings the course was fantastic! The course tutors led the teaching in such a way that no matter whether we fully grasped the new concepts or missed a few of the details, we all gained something from each session, both practical and in theory. Being on the basic conducting course, we successfully attempted to call a quarter of Plain Bob Doubles with the 5 students in my group each calling two extents and our course tutor calling a final 60 from the tenor. The course gave us the basic tools that we needed to progress with relative ease to the world of coursing orders in the advanced conducting course next time round. As a small bonus, I attended a Plain and Little Bob spliced optional session, which in much the same way gave us the tools to begin to call spliced methods as well as the brief introduction to putting Cambridge and St. Clements into the mix to create an even more wonderfully complex piece.
